FELLOWSHIP FOR STUDENTS: Robert E. Bryan Fellowships, UNC Entrepreneurial Public Service Fellowships. **Application deadlines: February 16, 2007** and is offered by the Carolina Center for Public Service. Eligibility: Any returning, full-time undergraduate or graduate student enrolled at UNC-Chapel Hill is eligible to apply for a fellowship. Proposals from undergraduate and graduate students are considered separately, and if possible, at least two fellowships from each program will go to undergraduates. Descriptions: Each Fellow plans and works on their summer project with a community partner as well as a faculty mentor who is familiar with the Fellow's topic and/or geographic area. The idea/concept of the project can be identified by students, faculty, or the community. However it is identified, the student must be responsible for the major planning and implementation of the project. Fellows receive a stipend of up to \$3,000 to fund the project. Faculty Mentors receive stipends of \$500 for supporting the students' work. CLASS OF 1938 SUMMER STUDY ABROAD FELLOWSHIP: The UNC-Chapel Hill Alumni Class of 1938 annually awards summer study abroad fellowships to U.S. students interested in pursuing independent career or personal projects outside the United States. This is a unique scholarship program because it provides financial assistance to students who could not perform independent projects abroad without the support of the Class of 1938 funding. Fellowships of \$3500 each are awarded. The number and amount of the fellowships are subject to approval by the 1938 Endowment Committee board members.

Eligibility

Currently enrolled UNC-Chapel Hill sophomores and juniors are eligible to apply. Seniors who will be taking a fifth year of coursework are also eligible to apply. All applicants must be U.S. citizens. All applicants must be enrolled at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill for the Fall or Spring 2007-2008 semesters. All applicants are requested to meet with the Endowment Committee at the annual meeting in the Spring of 2008 held at UNC-Chapel Hill to give a brief verbal report of the previous summer's activities.

Terms of Award

The fellowship amount is awarded prior to the end of the spring semester 2007. Applicants must be available in person at UNC-Chapel Hill for interviews on Tuesday, March 20, 2007 and Saturday, March 24, 2007. The recipients will be expected to use the award during the summer of 2007 for the purpose described in their project proposal.

Selection Process

The Office of International Student and Scholar Services coordinates a screening committee that selects the finalists who interview with the Class of 1938 Selection Committee. The best candidates are those who indicate their interest in an independent study project that is tied to their personal and/or career aspirations and have financial need of scholarship funding to pursue this project. Motivation for study abroad as a learning experience and excitement about the project are also significant factors. Strong consideration will be given to candidates whose university records demonstrate their seriousness of academic purpose and to students who lack the sufficient funds to pursue the project. A project should be well thought out and researched as much as possible for feasibility and cost factors.

Application Process

A completed application form plus six copies and an official transcript from the registrar's office must be submitted to the Office of International Student and Scholar Services by 4:00 p.m. on Wednesday, February 21, 2007. NOTICE FROM THE OFFICE OF SPONSORED RESEARCH REGARDING NIH INSTITUTIONAL TRAINING GRANTS: With 40 recent changes to NIH budgeting of Institutional Training Grants, the University has reviewed its practice of reporting non-liquidated obligations. For consistency and to ensure that the University is complying with NIH policies, the following will be implemented effective with all grants beginning July 1, 2007.

Trainees may be appointed throughout the budget period. However, only stipend, tuition (including fees), and health insurance remaining for appointed trainees will be reported as non-liquidated obligations as of the end of the budget period. To clarify, no unused travel or trainee-related expenses with the exception of health insurance will be available for expenditure past the end of the budget period.

Accordingly, we strongly encourage all departments to make appointments as close to the beginning of the budget period as possible to ensure that trainees have access to all financial resources of the grant.

GRANT FOR FACULTY: *Application deadline is March 5, 2007.*

Types of Grants: Research grants support the scientific, scholarly or artistic efforts of faculty. They may be used for costs such as collecting pilot data, research related travel, research equipment or supplies, or the costs of smaller scale projects. The University Research Council encourages the use of URC grants as a stepping stone to extramural support. Publication grants help pay the costs of publishing scientific, scholarly or artistic work. They may be used to pay for such things as photographs, drawings, figures or tables, or permission to reprint. A faculty member may submit only one URC proposal for each semester – either research or publication.

Eligibility: Applications must be full-time members of the faculty in the tenure, tenure-track, or research professorial or clinical ranks, OR be professional librarians in the analogous librarian ranks. Adjunct professors are not eligible for URC grants, nor are lecturers, instructors or other non professional rank. Preference is given to less senior applicants only for the purpose of breaking ties.

Amount of Award: The maximum award is \$5,000.

GRANTS TO FACULTY, STAFF AND STUDENTS: The Robertson Scholars Collaboration Fund has been instituted to fund projects that have potential to initiate or enhance collaborative projects between Duke and UNC. Faculty, staff and students on both campuses are eligible to apply. One-year grants of up to \$5,000 will be awarded, and a total of up to \$50,000 is available for this year's competition. All proposals should demonstrate how they will initiate new programs or significantly enhance an existing Duke/UNC collaboration. We are looking for ideas where collaboration between the schools might result in something greater than the sum of their individual parts. We are also looking for proposals that have the potential to impact a large number of students on both campuses. It is important that applicants make it clear who the partners are on each campus. This is best done by submitting truly joint applications that clearly show participation by both campuses. We prefer those proposals where the Robertson funds are important for the project and those projects that might not happen without Robertson funds. ANNOUNCEMENT FROM NIH: Beginning on February 1, 2007, the National Institutes of Health (NIH) will allow applicants and their institutions to identify more than one Principal Investigator (PI) on applications to many grant programs. NIH will extend the multiple PI option to most research grant applications when they transition to an electronic format. NIH expects the availability of the multiple PI option to encourage interdisciplinary and other team approaches to biomedical research.

The Office of the Vice Chancellor for Research and Economic Development at UNC-Chapel Hill invites faculty and postdoctoral researchers and research administrators to attend the National Institutes of Health (NIH) Regional Seminar on the NIH funding process---from application preparation to post-award administration. The seminar will take place Tuesday through Thursday, April 24 - 26, 2007, at the Sheraton Imperial Hotel in Research Triangle Park, North Carolina. This regional seminar provides a chance to meet with NIH directors, compliance officers, program specialists and policy makers to discuss issues concerning funding your research.

Discussions of issues affecting NIH funding and grant administration will give conference participants a comprehensive, up-to-date view of NIH-sponsored research. Other discussion topics will include the fundamentals of conducting business with NIH (grant application preparation, electronic submission, peer review, budget analysis, and award determination), and current topics (strategic and financial management plans, indirect costs, and effective administration between NIH and recipients). The format will include case studies, group discussions, formal presentations, and time for conference participants to meet informally with NIH representatives to discuss topics of special interest.

The seminar is hosted by University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, Duke University, North Carolina Biotechnology Center, North Carolina Central University, North Carolina State University, and RTI International.
